I want to extend a special thank you to the United Way, the Seimer Institute, the Rees-Jones Foundation, and the Dallas Foundation for their continued trust and investment in our mission. I am also grateful to Brian Hegi, Ben Eakes, and the entire Golf Committee for hosting a record-breaking tournament, and to Ellen Kershaw for chairing a phenomenal Annual Interfaith Auxiliary Luncheon. These events not only raised critical funds but also amplified our message of hope throughout the community. In addition, our Board of Directors set a new record by raising more than \$170,000 in annual giving. I am incredibly proud of the dedication and generosity of our board and the collective commitment of all who give so faithfully to Interfaith.



The results of this investment speak for themselves. This past fiscal year, 96 percent of parents exited our program with full-time employment, 97 percent of families exited into permanent housing, and 85 percent of school-age children advanced one or more grade levels in reading and math. These outcomes represent more than numbers. They reflect families breaking the cycle of poverty and building legacies of stability and success for the next generation.

I am especially grateful for the leadership of Kimberly Williams and the dedication of our entire leadership team and staff. Their tireless efforts ensure that Interfaith remains a place of stability, dignity, and hope for the families we serve.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, thank you for your commitment to Interfaith. Your generosity makes our mission possible, and together we are providing housing, help, and hope for families in crisis.



2026 FORECAST

For Vulnerable Families



As we look toward 2026, it is clear that working-class, single-income families are heading into a year filled with economic uncertainty and limited room for survival. The pressures of high housing costs, rising food prices, stagnant wages, and unequal opportunities are converging at once. Families of color and single mothers are expected to feel these challenges most acutely. Without support, the coming year could mirror or even surpass the hardships experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Housing Costs

Housing will continue to be one of the greatest challenges. **Rents are nearly 22% higher** than before the pandemic, and the median renter household has only \$250 left after paying rent each month. The "Housing Wage," or the hourly wage required to afford a modest two-bedroom rental, is now \$33.63 per hour, according to the National Low Income Housing Coalition. This is far beyond the earnings of most working-class families, leaving many on the edge of eviction or homelessness.

Food Insecurity

Food insecurity is also expected to rise in 2026. The USDA projects **food prices will increase by 2.7%**, with groceries rising by 2.3% and dining costs by 3.3%. At the same time, H.R.1 will restrict access to SNAP benefits, tightening eligibility and reducing assistance. This combination of higher costs and reduced benefits will leave parents with devastating choices, deciding whether to pay rent and utilities or feed their children.

Jobs, Wages and Equity Gaps

Employment rates offer little relief. National unemployment is projected to remain around 4.2%, but **Black women will face unemployment rates closer to 6.7%.** Women of color continue to earn only 54-63 cents for every dollar earned by white men. These disparities mean that single-income households led by women of color will remain at the highest risk of eviction, food insecurity, and homelessness.

WHY IT MATTERS

Together, these trends paint a sobering picture of the year ahead. Rising rents, higher food costs, and inequities in the job market will push more families into crisis. Unless we act, 2026 may not only repeat the struggles of COVID but could represent an even more difficult era for vulnerable families.



INTERFAITH'S 2026 STRATEGY

To Strengthen Families



At Interfaith Family Services, we believe that while the challenges of 2026 are real, so is our opportunity to respond with hope, innovation, and impact. Our mission to provide housing, help, and hope for families in crisis is more critical than ever. To meet the coming demand, we are preparing strategies that stabilize families in the short term while equipping both parents and children for long-term success.

Stabilizing Families in Crisis

We are expanding our Rent and Utilities Fund to prevent evictions and our Food Purchase Fund to meet the anticipated surge in food pantry requests. These safety nets will ensure families do not have to make the devastating choice between paying rent or feeding their children.

Preparing Parents for the Future of Work

We are also looking ahead to the future of the job market. As AI and automation reshape industries, we are researching how these changes will affect the families we serve and adjusting our training programs accordingly. By adding new certifications, strengthening digital literacy, and introducing STEM-focused pathways, we are equipping parents with the skills to compete for higher-paying and more secure jobs.

Equipping Children for Long-Term Success

For children, Interfaith is **expanding STEM-based after-school and summer programs** that include coding, robotics, and technology-driven learning. These programs complement our proven record of helping more than 80% of children advance academically and prepare them to thrive in a changing economy.




A CALL FOR PARTNERSHIP

Fighting for Families:

How Our Programs Transform Lives

At Interfaith Family Services, we believe families in crisis deserve more than temporary relief. They deserve stability, dignity, and a clear path to a brighter future. That is why every one of our programs is designed not only to meet immediate needs but also to empower parents and children with the tools to thrive long after they leave our campus.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING



Home & Hope Transitional Housing Program

Our *Home & Hope* Transitional Housing Program provides fully-furnished apartments for families experiencing homelessness. Families can stay in the program for 9 to 12 months, giving them the time they need to rebuild. Upon graduation, parents not only exit with permanent housing and full-time employment but also keep the furnishings from their apartment. In addition, all monthly occupancy fees they have paid are returned to them to help cover deposits and the costs of getting on their feet. This model ensures that families graduate with both stability and resources to sustain success.

Remain-At-Home Rent Assistance Program

For families at risk of eviction, the Remain-at-Home Rent Assistance Program provides critical financial support that keeps them in their homes. Paired with coaching and accountability, this program does more than cover bills. It gives parents time and support to stabilize their budgets, manage debt, and build savings to prevent future crises.

Family Empowerment Program

All transitional housing and rent assistance clients participate in our Family Empowerment Program. This holistic model includes weekly financial coaching, career coaching and job training to help parents elevate wages, professional counseling services to promote emotional health, and practical life-skills courses such as cooking and healthy-living. This comprehensive support ensures families are equipped to break cycles of poverty rather than simply surviving them.

Our Programs Transform Lives

Moody Family Childcare Center

Affordable, quality childcare is often the greatest barrier to a parent's ability to work. The Moody Family Childcare Center eliminates that barrier by providing onsite childcare for infants and preschoolers. For unemployed parents in our program, childcare is offered so they can actively participate in coaching, classes, and job searches. This program not only supports parents but also prepares young children for academic success.

Hope & Horizons Afterschool and Summer Program

School-age children need safe, structured environments where they can thrive academically and socially. Our *Hope & Horizons* Program provides homework help, tutoring in reading and math, and enrichment activities like arts, sports, and STEM learning. During the summer, the program expands into a full-day camp that ensures children stay on track academically and have opportunities to explore, create, and grow.


Food Pantry

No parent should have to choose between paying rent and feeding their children. Our Food Pantry provides groceries and household staples to families in crisis, reducing immediate stress and allowing parents to redirect limited funds toward rent, utilities, or job-related expenses. The pantry is supported by volunteers and donors who ensure shelves are stocked year-round.

THE INTERFAITH DIFFERENCE

What makes Interfaith unique is the way these programs work together. Housing and rent support provide stability. Coaching and training equip parents with skills and confidence. Childcare and youth programs prepare the next generation for success. And the food pantry ensures no family goes hungry while they work toward stability.

Together, these programs transform lives, one family at a time.

MEET NIA A Mother's Story

In August 2024, Nia experienced an unexpected setback when she was laid off from her job. While she quickly secured new employment as a Medical Assistant, the transition came too late to prevent her eviction, leaving her and her two young daughters, ages 2 and 3, without a home. Determined to rebuild, Nia reached out to Interfaith Family Services after learning about the program from a friend. She was invited for an intake interview and was accepted into the *Home & Hope* Transitional Housing Program in October 2024.

From the moment she arrived, Nia committed herself fully to the program. Her girls attended the Moody Family Childcare Center, allowing her to focus on stabilizing her family and advancing her career. She actively engaged in counseling, case management, and financial coaching to reduce expenses and create a sustainable household



budget. Through dedication and consistent effort, she completed 18 financial coaching sessions, successfully saved \$8,080.00, and paid down nearly \$1,000.00 in debt.

Her hard work paid off.

In September 2025, Nia and her daughters proudly moved into their new home. Today, they are thriving. Her daughters continue to attend the Moody Family Childcare Center and are growing, learning, and laughing each day. Nia continues to excel in her career, equipped with financial skills and the stability she worked so hard to achieve. Nia's determination and resilience shine as an example of what is possible when families have the support they need to overcome their obstacles faced during unfortunate circumstances.

THE MARTINEZ FAMILY

A mom and dad with two school-aged children — one with special needs — were struggling to find affordable childcare that would allow them both to work. Their youngest child, Alexia, needed extra attention and support, and finding a program that could meet those needs seemed out of reach.

Through our program, the family found not only affordable care but also a caring community ready to help. With the help of dedicated volunteers who provided one-on-one support, both children began to thrive. The child with special needs received the additional guidance they needed to grow in confidence and ability, while their sibling also excelled alongside them.

Today, both children are doing exceptionally well — showing tremendous growth and now testing above their grade level. With the additional support that was provided by Moody Childcare and Youth Services Center, this family has found balance, stability, and a renewed sense of hope for the future.

Since 1985, Interfaith Family Services has stood as a place of stability, dignity, and hope for families in crisis. For nearly four decades, we have walked with parents and children through some of the hardest seasons of their lives. We have been here through Hurricane Katrina, the recession of 2008, the global pandemic, and countless personal crises faced by our families. In every season, Interfaith has remained a steady anchor because of the generosity and vision of our supporters.

We have also made bold decisions to ensure our longevity. In 2015, Interfaith ended its reliance on government funding so that no external policy change could jeopardize our mission. Since then, we have diversified our funding base so that no single funder or event accounts for more than 10 percent of our budget. This strategy has protected Interfaith's stability and allowed us to grow stronger and more innovative with each passing year.

Now, as we look to the next 40 years, the next step is building an Interfaith Endowment of \$5 million or more. This endowment, managed by the Dallas Foundation, will generate steady income that guarantees Interfaith is always here for families—no matter the economic or social climate. By investing in the endowment, you help write the story of Interfaith's future.

2025 Fundraising Events

10th Annual Interfaith Auxiliary Luncheon

Interfaith Family Services' 10th Annual Auxiliary Luncheon set a new record, raising over \$250,000 to support families experiencing homelessness and poverty. Held at the Dallas Arboretum's Rosine Hall, the event welcomed 250 guests for an afternoon of inspiration, generosity, and community.

Luncheon Chair Ellen Kershaw and Honorary Chair Katey Plummer led the program alongside emcee Lesley McCaslin, Dallas Mavericks Sideline Reporter. Board Chair Adam Goldenberg highlighted the organization's lasting impact before introducing keynote speaker and Interfaith graduate Brooke Bujol, whose powerful story of resilience brought the mission to life and moved the audience to a standing ovation.

"There was something truly special about the luncheon," said Chair Ellen Kershaw. "It was inspiring to see so many people come together to celebrate the strength of Interfaith families and to invest in their success. The generosity in that room was extraordinary." CEO Kimberly Williams added, "Thanks to our incredible Chairs and the generosity of our sponsors and donors, we surpassed our goal, raising \$252,569 to fight poverty and homelessness."

18th Annual Golf Classic

The **18th Annual Golf Classic** was a record-breaking success, raising more than \$150,000, the most in Interfaith Family Services' history. Held September 15th at Gleneagles Golf Club, the sold-out tournament united corporate partners and community supporters to help families in crisis build lasting stability.

Led by Presenting Sponsor Crossplane Capital and Co-Chairs Brian Hegi and Ben Eakes, the event high-lighted the power of collaboration. Proceeds fund transitional housing, rent assistance, and wraparound services such as childcare, career coaching, and counseling to empower families to achieve independence.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

In addition to our core programs, Interfaith Family Services is deeply committed to creating opportunities for families to connect, celebrate, and build memories. SAVE Summer

This year, more than 100 children participated in SAVE Summer, a month-long camp designed to keep children engaged academically and socially during school breaks. With a focus on reading, math, and enrichment activities, 85% of children maintained or improved their academic skills. Parents also benefitted, knowing their children were safe and supported while they worked.



Annual Christmas Store

More than 40 families shopped with dignity at our Christmas Store, choosing gifts for their children at no cost. Volunteers wrapped presents, cared for children, and created a holiday experience full of joy and hope. This tradition ensured that every child experienced the magic of Christmas, while parents experienced the dignity of giving.



Halloween On-Site Trick or Treating

Interfaith hosted an on-campus celebration where 75 children enjoyed a safe and fun Halloween experience. Families decorated doors, volunteers provided candy, and children experienced the joy of community celebration in a safe environment.



Second Saturday Service Projects

Every month, community groups came together for Second Saturday projects, completing more than 2,000 hours of service in 2024. These projects ranged from beautifying the campus to organizing pantry supplies, ensuring Interfaith families live in a safe and welcoming environment.




Birthday Party Project


